I first met the UUMAN community during my "Candidating Week" in May 2016. (Candidating Week culminates with a congregational vote re-

garding whether or not to "Call" the particular minister selected by the congregation's Search Committee.)

During that whirlwind week I had the natural assumption that everyone I'd met had been a member of UUMAN for years and that everyone knew everything about the inner workings of the congregation. That's likely a natural assumption that every new member has - that everyone has been here forever, that everyone knows everything yet I (i.e. the new member) don't know anything, don't know how anything works and surely don't want to break anything.

The reality though is that many, many congregants may have been attending for only a few months longer than our newest members; and many more congregants have been here for less than a year.

For a new member, there is no trial period where the congregation is vetting them to see if they're really cut out for UUMAN. No, our newest members don't need to ask permission to volunteer in any capacity. New members don't need to wait to be asked to do anything. They are free to jump right in.

Here are some easy things our newest members OR ANYONE can do:

1. Sunday Morning Greeter – What a nice, easy way to meet the people and visitors at UUMAN. No experience necessary. We will tell you what to say.

- 2. Brew Crew Volunteer to make the coffee on Sunday mornings. You'll have to get here between 9 - 9:30 to get started; bet as the maker of the coffee, you instantly become the most beloved member of the congregation!
 - 3. Children/Youth Religious Education Instructor - Get to know our amazing and talented young people. With minimal prep you'll also be intimately learning what Unitarian Universalism is all about. (Watch out: Being a six- year Youth Group advisor is what led me to ministry!)
 - 4. Worship Associate Yes...you can be up front on Sundays! As a Worship Associate, you get to participate in the creative process of worship, taking on as much or as little as you want each Sunday. We need to hear your voice!
 - 5. Sing in the Choir Anyone can sing in the choir. There is no musical training, reading of music, etc. necessary. There is instant camaraderie in the Choir...and they know how to have fun.

These are just a few easy ways to get involved at UUMAN...and there are countless others (e.g. Gardening, Social Justice, 2nd Hour Adult Enrichment, Website, etc.)

After we vote on Nov. 5, the new Georgia Legislature will be set. What justice-impacting Georgia legislation may be in store? Let's talk about it! at UU GA Legislative Action Network's Annual Conference .

Mark your calendar: Saturday, November 16 from 9:30 – 3:30 at UUCA in Atlanta and on Zoom.

The hybrid format enables UU's from across Georgia to conveniently participate -- in person or as a group gathered in your worship space. For people less than 3 hours from Atlanta, we recommend meeting with fellow UU's in-person at the conference at UUCA, 2650 North Druid Hills Rd, Atlanta.

The conference program includes dialogue with issue experts about what the legislature's priorities may be in 2025. We'll dialogue also with each other about how to encourage congregation members to be active in 2025.

November Board Corner

The UUMAN Board of Trustees meets monthly to review current activity and issues facing our congregation. We do two key things at the beginning of each meeting (right after the chalice lighting) to calibrate and ground ourselves for the business at hand.

The first is a joint reaffirmation of our Board Covenant, which is:

"With love, we promise:

To communicate in a transparent and caring way with each other.

To listen intentionally and respectfully, with an open mind.

To conduct our work with integrity, responsibility, and faithfulness.

To respond to disagreement with humility, honesty, and empathy."

Then a board member will lead us through a short reading or exercise that we call KTMTTMT, "Keeping the Main Thing the Main Thing." This is meant to provide perspective, inspiration, and a reminder that our purpose in meeting is to serve the UUMAN congregation and our community, carrying out our vision to Nurture the Spirit, Strive for Justice, and Transform the World.

During our October meeting, the KTMTTMT was about doing a "Fall Reset." Autumn is a time of transition in nature, and I have found that it is invariably a time of transition for me as well. Fall has always felt like the real beginning of the year, with school starting, job changes, moves, relationship beginnings and endings, and deaths & births.

John and Julie Gottman are marriage researchers and counselors, who offer the following process for doing a Fall Reset - it applies to individuals as well as couples. I encourage you to give it a try!

The fall season is the perfect time to hit the reset button in your life. What's the reset button? It's a way of expressing the need for shedding old habits and nurturing what truly matters. By letting go of what no longer serves us, we create space for personal growth and connection. This season encourages us to rekindle our bonds, make cherished memories, and embrace the beauty of change.

Here are three ideas to help you hit the reset button:

- Make a list of all the people you care about in this world. Ask yourself, "What is one thing I can do to make each of these people feel more loved right now?" Then do all those things on your list.
- Take some time to think about your daily habits and rituals, as well as the rituals of connection you share with your partner. What rituals are no longer serving you? Make a point to remove any outdated rituals and identify a new ritual to start that will enhance your life.
- Think about the new path you would like to take. List how that new path will be different from the path you are currently on. How will you embark on this new path?

Political and social engagement does not end with elections!



Your Social Justice team has been very busy in the last 4 months leading up to the elections.

We kicked off these efforts in July when we led a service for UU the Vote. In that service together with 80 attendees we did the "Rich Picture" exercise when we had the opportunity to create some art to visualize the world we would like to see after the elections. In that exercise we had the opportunity to engage in deep listening in a shared experience.

The feedback we received from the service was heartwarming and has helped us move forward with more energy and determination.

From the beginning we felt we needed to engage our UU sisters churches to learn about their efforts towards the elections. We contacted and held meetings with UUCA, Gwinnett, Dahlonega and Emerson.

We also engaged with organizations and partners in our community, deepening and creating new relationships. Organizations such as Groveway, GLAHR (GA Latino Alliance for Human Rights), Southern Poverty Law Center, Center for Common Ground, NFCC, GA Justice Project and Voter Registration Day, Vote Forward, and Southern Center for Democracy to name a few.

On August 25th we organized a letter writing party to infrequent voters in rural GA. More than 40 congregants joined us on that day and together we wrote 600 letters from Vote Forward.

As a congregation many of you also wrote 400 postcards from Common Ground for Democracy incenting people to vote. More than 40 congregants participated in that effort.

Together as a congregation, under the leadership of Gus Hadorn, we implemented the Rosie's Chart. This tool allowed us to become more accountable, incentivizing our volunteer hours in an effort to protect our democracy.

A group of us took to the streets for the national Voter Registration Day. We held signs and talked to people in their cars promoting voter registration and distributing educational materials. Some participants had never done that before and those who were there felt a sense of achievement and camaraderie which comes from a shared goal.

At the end of September your Social Justice team together with the Southern Poverty Law Center organized a Town Hall for Democracy. That day we had more than 30 attendees. That initiative allowed us to further our partnerships in our community and discuss such crucial issues regarding the elections and democracy.

We have also participated in phone banking efforts with GLAHR. In that effort we reached out to more than 200 voters in rural GA. Our goal was to remind them of the early voting dates. We are also phone banking with UU the Vote in other states where crucial issues such as reproductive rights are at stake in this election.

Some of our members are taking the next step and volunteering first hand as poll watchers and ballot monitors.

We've empowered our younger minds and hearts by introducing them to the electoral process by voting on the new name of the recently constructed outdoor space. The Premo and UUMAN kids chose "Whimsical Woods."

Many of us are frustrated and feel helpless with the direction our country seems to follow. There is a lot to be concerned about. We feel that a way out of this helplessness is ACTION. What we do, our energy and conviction affect the people around us and ourselves.

A lot has been accomplished and now it is time to CELEBRATE. Join us on November 10 @ noon in a joyful celebration of our efforts and achievements. We will have some games, food and drinks. We are also looking for volunteers to help set up and clean that day.

We encourage you to remain active after the elections. There are many issues that need our ongoing engagement.
