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## The Passing of Pope Francis

As you all likely know, Pope Francis passed away on Monday, April 21, 2025 at the age of 88 after serving as pontiff since 2013. Best pope in my lifetime thus far.

Perhaps his most famous utterance took place at a press conference in the first months of his papacy when asked about the possibility of homosexuals serving as clergy. He responded, "If someone is gay and is searching for the Lord and has good will, then who am I to judge him?"

Then, in 2015 he published his first encyclical entitled *Laudato si'* which called upon the faith to combat global warming, consumerism and punitive capitalism.

He eventually came around to allowing clergy to bless same-sex unions. Yet he was a person of his times – as we all are. Such a blessing was to be conferred in a pastoral, and never in a sacramental, way. This often led to confusion and criticism. Frank Bruni of the New York Times wrote that, "...for every advance, there was an asterisk, and for every proclamation of love, a delineation of limits, so that Francis personified the indelible tension in the church's official teaching about homosexuality, which he never squarely renounced (Frank Bruni, NY Times, April 22, 2025)."

...but there were progressive advances nonetheless; and these advances came at a cost. For the most part, he didn't substantially change church teachings and doctrines yet gave progressives Catholics around the world the freedom to modernize in way that

worked for them. For Catholic conservatives, such actions, at best, sewed confusion regarding the interpretation of church teachings and doctrine; at worst, it riled and emboldened those who saw such actions as blatant disrespect of those teachings and doctrines.

We Unitarian Universalists have our own views on doctrine (be it Catholic or any kind of doctrine), yet I've always been inspired by the ministry of Jesus as related in the Gospels and the only doctrine that I seem to carry forward from those texts say, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind....and love your neighbor as yourself (Matthew 22:37-40);" and to illustrate the importance of caring for those less fortunate, Jesus said, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me (Matthew 25:40)."

Pope Francis may have had his faults. He may have been an imperfect pope. Yet he was always consistent about that doctrine articulated in the Gospel of Matthew. His ministry was more like Jesus' than any pope in my lifetime thus far: a ministry to the poor, the outcast, the marginalized, the hungry, the stranger, the migrant.

Francis' actions, what he actually did, taught us more than any official church teachings and doctrines ever could.

He will be missed.

Nurture our spirit. Strive for Justice.

Transform the world.

## An Important Announcement from Earth Ministry

We at Uuman set the standard, and we are running late. Please heed the call.

A world without Butterflies

You would have to be sadistic to kill a butterfly.

These fluttering beauties offer wonder and inspiration, and a much-needed expression of freedom. Yet kill them we do. Bugs and spiders are not our enemies. We have made war on the environment; now our weapons are turned on us.

A young man knocked on my door yesterday wanting to poison the pests for a fee, pests that I don't have. I happen to like spiders and bugs. Most of them do good service. Even the mosquito, but I'll come back to them.

My family enjoys the world beyond our doorstep. We live among big trees, beside a little creek with native plants, birds, pollinators, and other critters.

All of us in Pine Valley breath the same air, and we are all victims of the many poisons that come with the wind and water. Pest control is a 24-billion-dollar industry in this country, and like much of what is advertised, they peddle fear and hedge the truth. Green washing is now a part of their game. They know we care, but not that much.

The natural world is a finely tuned miracle that we are a part of, but more and more we have become a destructive part. The Monarch is now on the endangered list. In the last 50 years we have lost 30% of the bird population. 96% of our backyard birds require insects to feed their young. And it's clear to everyone paying attention that insects are disappearing at an alarming rate. Habitat loss and the incredible number of chemicals on the market,

many of which are unregulated, are the major sources of the problem. Even where regulations exist chemical lobbyist have written or highly influenced the regulations. Glyphosate, for God's sake, is exhibit number one.

Syngenta the maker of 217 different chemical products for crop protection just settle a lawsuit for 1.5 billion dollars related to Parkinson disease. Bayer who recently bought Monsanto is presently lobbying lawmakers across the country for protection against lawsuits. To date they have paid out 10 billion dollars for product damage, and still have 67,000 lawsuits pending. Their premier product Round-up is the most widely used herbicide in the world, and Georgia was their first legislative success. The bill is currently on the Governor's desk.

Regarding the mosquito—The most used chemical control is Pyrethrin or the synthetic version, a broad-spectrum insecticide highly toxic to bees, butterflies, dragonflies, etc. as well as aquatic critters. So, what to do? Chuck the toxic. Empty standing water. Encourage what nature provides—dragonflies, frogs, bats, and birds, wear long-sleeves, use mosquito dunks, fans, oil of lemon eucalyptus. You have choices. Butterflies don't. Toughen up, for the sake of life on the planet.

## UUMAN Board 101- Q & A

If you are newer to UUMAN (or if you are a long-timer who has not paid much attention to our church governance), here is some basic UUMAN board information for you, so you can attend our May 18 election “in the know”!

**Q: How many board members are there, and what are their positions?**

**A:** There are 6 members: Vice President, President, Past President, Treasurer, Special Projects, and Secretary. The Minister and DRE usually attend the board meetings but are not voting members of the Board.

**Q: How long are their terms?**

**A:** Two years for Treasurer, Special Projects and Secretary. Three years for the trustee who spends the first year as Vice President, second year as President, and third year as Past President.

**Q: How are Board Trustees elected?**

**A:** Members are nominated for each open position and once a year in May the congregation holds an election. Any member in good standing may vote, and a quorum of 20% of full members is required.

**Q: What are the open positions we will be voting on During the May 18th meeting?**

**A:** We will be electing a new Vice President, Special Projects trustee and Secretary. You will be receiving an email prior to the meeting to introduce the slate of candidates.

**Q: What should I bring to the potluck prior to the Congregational Meeting?**

**A:** Hmmm, tough question. But whatever delicious dish you bring, please label it as Vegetarian, Vegan, Dairy, Meat, etc., and remember to take your dish home afterwards! See you there!

### UUNEI Pilgrimage to Meghalya

A trip is being offered from Oct. 22nd-Oct. 30th to visit our partner church in the Meghalya, NE India. The trip is a good introduction to Unitarianism in the Khasi Hills. It is being planned by a former travel consultant with the UU Partner Church Council, John Dale and led by his wife, Csilla Kolcsar, who has been apart of this trip at least six times. John and Csilla bring a wealth of knowledge and insight.

My husband, Mike and I did this trip with John and Csilla in 2015. It was an incredibly meaningful journey-we shared experiences with others, and it fostered lasting friendships that have continued.

There is opportunity for sight seeing too. In the East Khasi Hills, is the town Cherrapunji, one of the wettest places on earth, where living root bridges are formed by rubber trees. Cherrapunji, is part of the Indo-Burma biodiversity hotspot, making it a treasure trove of flora and fauna.(1) The region boasts over 600 species of birds, including migratory species from as far as Serbia and Mongolia. It is also home to 137 rare, endemic, or threatened plant species.(2) The lush forests, natural caves, and unique climatic conditions contribute to its incredible biodiversity. However, human activities and high rainfall have led to some degradation of the landscape.

Transfer to motor coach for 3-hour drive from Gauhati airport to Shillong. Hotel check-in. Group dinner with local Khasi ministers, orientation & introductions. Overnight – Hotel Centre Point. (D).

#### Thursday, October 23 – Day 02: SHILLONG

Breakfast at hotel. Morning tour of Don Bosco Museum of indigenous cultures. Group lunch back at the hotel followed by afternoon shopping excursion & walkabout in central Shillong through the nearby Police Bazaar to vibrant city market. Free time for shopping. Afternoon conversation with UUNEI leaders on Khasi Unitarian history and theology, and UUNEI polity.– dinner on your own. Overnight Shillong – Hotel Centre Point. (BL),



#### Friday, October 24 - Day 03: SHILLONG - JOWAI - SHILLONG

Breakfast at the hotel before departing for Jowai (2 hours). Just outside of Jowai we detour to visit Monolith Park where hundreds of ancient stone monoliths provide striking evidence of the indigenous tribal religion. Group lunch before continuing on to Jowai where we visit the Jowai Unitarian Church & Margaret Barr Unitarian school before returning to Shillong. Dinner on your own. Overnight - Shillong Hotel Centre Point. (BL)

## UUNEI Pilgrimage to Meghalya



### Saturday, October 25 – Day 04: SHILLONG – KHARANG - VILLAGES

Exact itinerary and destinations for this day will be determined by the group composition. Depart Shillong after breakfast. Morning drive to Kharang (2 hours). Visits to the local Unitarian church & school. Tour and lunch at the Unitarian-run “Children’s Village” before continuing to the partner villages. Those pilgrims with partner churches in NE India where home stays are possible will be delivered to their villages. Travelers without partner churches or whose partners are unable to host visitors overnight will return to Shillong for home stays in the city. Meal(s) with partners or on your own. (BLD)

### Sunday, October 26 – Day 05: VILLAGES - SHILLONG

Breakfast with partners/hosts. Free day with hosts to share their surroundings and get more familiar. Afternoon worship services with partners or in one of the Shillong congregations. Late lunch/reception with partners/hosts following. Transportation back to the city for out of town worshipers. Return to Hotel Centre Point. Free evening to freshen up, rest, and repack. Overnight Shillong – Hotel Centre Point (BL)

### Monday, October 27 – Day 06: SHILLONG – CHEERAPUNJEE

Breakfast and check out at the hotel. Scenic drive to Cherrapunjee National Park. (2 hours). Bag lunch at picnic area on the bluffs overlooking Bangladesh. Entertainment by resort staff and Dinner & overnight Cheerapunjee Holiday Resort. (BLD)

### Tuesday, October 28 - Day 07: CHERRAPUNJEE

Full day in Cherrapunjee (beautiful area of hills, gorges and waterfalls); points of interest such as Nohkalikai Falls (2nd highest in India) and Nohsngithiang Falls (beautiful views of Bangladesh on clear days) are possible stops. There will also be a guided (very strenuous) hike to one or more of the famous Khasi “living bridges”. (There is a less difficult walk to a nearby living bridge that is under reconstruction). Sack lunch. Dinner & overnight Cheerapunjee Holiday Resort. (BLD)

### Wednesday, October 29 - Day 08: CHERRAPUNJEE - SHILLONG

Breakfast at resort followed by free morning to stroll and/or visit to the local history museum. Light lunch before departing for Shillong. En route we visit the Cheerapunjee Unitarian Church. Afternoon visit to the tea plantation outside Shillong. Hotel check-in. Free time to repack. Farewell group dinner. (BLD)

### Thursday, October 30 - Day 09: SHILLONG - DELHI or PARO, BHUTAN

Travel day. Breakfast at hotel before retracing our route to Gauhati airport for early afternoon flights to Delhi International Airport or Paro to begin Bhutan extension. Late PM arrival in Delhi to connect to onward International flights. For those who want an airport hotel there is an extra fee of \$170 per room.
