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Looking Back and Moving Forward: FUEL UUMAN Stewardship Update

As we prepare to begin a new church year on July 1st, we want to take a moment to reflect

on our FUEL UUMAN Stewardship Campaign for 2025–2026.

It's been a meaningful journey over the past couple of months. Together with Carla Rizatti, I had the privilege of co-chairing this year's campaign, and we're grateful for the generosity and engagement of this wonderful community.

Here's where we stand as of June 16, 2025:

- 122 households have pledged, with a total pledge amount of \$283,247.
- Our campaign goal is \$300,000, and we're getting close! With some pledges still supposed to come in, we are hopeful we will get closer to that goal.
- For comparison, last year we received 130 pledges totaling \$261,197, so we're already ahead in terms of total giving thank you!
- 31 members completed the Time & Talent form, which helps us learn more about how our members want to contribute their energy and gifts throughout the year. If you haven't had a chance to fill it out yet, it's never too late – we'd love to hear from you!

What we've learned:

Most pledges came in quickly in the first few weeks — many of you used the online form we shared via email and on our website. We also reached out through texts, phone calls, and even good old-fashioned mail for those we hadn't connected with yet. Thanks to all these efforts, we've heard from over 90% of our members.

That said, we know life gets busy — and if you have not yet, we request you to do so before July 1. Every pledge, no matter the size, helps support UUMAN's programs, staff, facilities, and shared mission. You can find the pledge form easily on our website under the "Give" section.

To those who have pledged: thank you! Let's start this new church year strong — together.

But in this age, there is a disconnect, a disconnect we see throughout the land, an arrogance of species, perhaps souls missing the wildness they grew from. Our mayor and council exhibit that disconnect. With a fountain pen and a chainsaw, the earth was altered in our town. Perhaps our greatest treasure, our finest and most historic trees were dropped in an afternoon.

We continue to destroy what we have so little of. With every tree cut we identify more with the sprawl that surrounds us. What once set us apart as a historic town in the trees on the Chattahoochee is losing color in each fading sunset.

Mountain Wisdom Inc., is a mentoring organization committed to fostering healthy teens and families by providing fun filled transformational experiences and challenging outdoor adventures focusing on nature awareness and responsibility.

Adolescence is a critical time of life; it is powerful and transformative. Teenagers can learn and grow from their experiences or be beaten down by them. Most kids at this time feel very much alone. Having adult role models is one of the critical things which can buffer the stress and heartache they all deal with. We meet each young person where they are.

We accomplish this in a complete natural setting. All electronic distractions, junk food and other parts of modern urban life are set aside. They are replaced with a mountain camp setting, fresh cooked food with vegan options. And days full of fun and challenging activities including, hiking, ropes course, music, dance, drumming, singing, archery, journaling, tracking, plant identification, knots, primitive skills, and shelter building.

Campers experience team building and leadership training through interactive, cooperative activities and trust building exercises. Environmental conservation, nature awareness and life skills are essential and help the youth connect to themselves and others.

Through all the different activities and experiences the youth feel a sense of purpose and self-worth. We work with them to set individual Smart Goals and personal purpose. They know they make a difference.
