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Several members of UUMAN kicked off the 2026 Georgia legislative session by showing up for "Pack the Cap" on Monday, Jan 12. "Pack the

Cap" was organized jointly by the ACLU of Georgia, Indivisible Georgia Coalition and ProGeorgia. Several hundred concerned citizens were in attendance of this informative event. Although many of the bills currently being sponsored by the majority are at cross purposes to our most dearly held beliefs and values, "Pack the Cap" was an uplifting and hopeful event.

Here is a quick overview of some of the bills being considered during the session:

HB397, SB175 – Contains multiple changes to election procedures, including restrictions on Saturday voting, absentee ballot delivery, State Election Board authority, and poll watcher access.

SB74/HB483 – Seeks to repeal the exemption that protects librarians and library staff from criminal liability when distributing materials that some claim are "harmful to minors." Under this bill, librarians could face a high and aggravated misdemeanor for lending or exhibiting certain materials – potentially leading to fines and jail time.

HB602 – Would strip state scholarship eligibility (such as HOPE, grants, and loans) from students who are convicted or disciplined for materially and substantially disruptive conduct (including protest-related arrests or violations of campus rules).

SB21 – Would take away legal protections from local governments and their employees that violate immigration laws, preventing schools or governing bodies from adopting "sanctuary" policies. The bill passed the Senate in 2025 but did not make it to a House vote. This vote may take place this session.

HB994 – Would elevate some protest activities from a misdemeanor to a felony

SB36 (Georgia Religious Freedom Restoration Act)

– Although framed as protecting religious exercise, critics warned it could be used to justify discriminatory actions against LGBTQ+ people and others.

SB30 and **SB39** (Gender-affirming care restrictions) - Intended to ban puberty blockers and other gender-affirming care for minors and aims to prohibit coverage for gender-affirming care under state-sponsored plans (including state employee and Medicaid plans).

Some bills being introduced by the minority party:

SB389 - Would ban ICE agents from wearing masks and require federal agents working on immigration enforcement to wear an identification badge

SB392 - Would prohibit the armed state forces like the National Guard to come into Georgia without permission of its elected leaders.

SB397 - Would allow people to bring personal lawsuits against federal officers who violate their rights during immigration raids.

The Unitarian Universalist Georgia Legislative Action Network uugalen.org and other organizations will be looking at these bills until the session ends (Sine Die) on April 2.

Safety Update

Your UUMAN Safety Committee, in concert with Operations, has been working to make our UUMAN campus more secure.

Cable Blocking Access to Upper Parking Lots

In late 2025, the Operations and Safety committees installed a barrier across the driveway beside Fellowship Hall, to prevent access to our upper parking lots during the week. We have long known that non-members use the upper parking lot as a place to meet and drink—we have even found syringes there. This area has also been used as a dumping ground for old household items, such as mattresses. So we thought it important to deter access during the week. The barrier was also recommended by the Roswell PD.

There is now a cable across the driveway with a combination lock. The cable will be taken down prior to services and other large events, so members can park as usual in the upper lot and the choir lot. The cable is flagged with multiple reflective signs; please check to make sure the cable is down when driving to the upper lot. If you have an event during the week for which you need access to the upper lot, contact safety@uuman.org.

Sliding Bolt Locks in Nursery and Choir Room

Previously, there were no locks for the nursery (the door to the hallway) or the choir-room doors. We installed sliding bolt locks to secure these doors. These bolts make it possible to shelter in place in these rooms in the event of a threat. The bolts are near the top of the door, to make it hard for children to engage them. Also, we now unlock the office door during service, to make sure there is an exit path through the office to the front parking lot in an emergency.

Remember, safety at UUMAN is everyone's responsibility. When you're leaving the church, check to make sure doors are locked. Please do not prop open sanctuary doors during service, when doors are locked. If you see something suspicious, let someone know.

Love in the Public Square and Being Alone

These are troubling times and many of us feel frustrated, scared, helpless, alone. The list could go on and on. I could also give you a grocery list of things "TO DO" but that would only dismiss those very feelings which drive our everyday interactions and inactions. That is NOT the purpose of these words.

This aloneness is a strategy. It has a purpose. It fills the void we feel when we see videos of people being detained, being pepper-sprayed, being shot on the streets and in detention centers. Everyone ends up deprived of our humanity. So, all we feel is a void that "they" want to fill with fear.

We each of us ask: what could I do to help? Could I be doing more? But there's a more important question to ask ourselves: What do I feel right now?

I say to you do not feel ALONE. This is why we come to church. This is why we feel the tug for connection, why we show up on Crabapple Road, why we donate to the auction, why we love our children and other people's children during religious education, why we volunteer at North Fulton Charities, why we talk to members of the Georgia General Assembly with our partners, why we elect people who hold our values as closely as their own.

That our President of the Unitarian Universalist Association, who was arrested in Minneapolis, is there, along with their staff. And that there are thousands of UU's out there, getting up every day, doing their thing, our thing, to stay visible, to stay connected, to feel alive in these troubling times.

And try this one last thing: reimagine our world as we would LOVE to see it be. Let your imagination soar, let your dream form in your mind and in your heart, let your words sing, let your steps lead your way home, and know that you are NOT alone.



Siding With Love: UU Justice in Action

As Unitarian Universalists, we are grounded in values of inherent worth and dignity, justice, equity, and compassion for all people. and our faith calls us to act on those values, not just speak them.

One powerful example of this faithful action came in Minneapolis in late January, where more than 800 clergy and faith leaders gathered to stand against harsh immigration enforcement. Nearly 100 clergy were arrested while demonstrating peacefully at the Minneapolis-St. Paul airport in below-freezing temperatures, urging an end to deportation flights and calling attention to the human impact of federal immigration policies, including UUA president, Rev. Dr. Sofía Betancourt. [Link to article](#)

Across the country, UU clergy and lay leaders have joined multifaith marches and rallies in solidarity with immigrant communities, standing shoulder-to-shoulder with neighbors facing fear and separation. [Link to article](#)

Locally and nationally, the Unitarian Universalist Association's organizing arm, Side With Love, continues to equip congregations with tools to act in justice-oriented ways. From advocating for immigrant rights and racial justice, to resisting policies that undermine human dignity.
